## **C-2 Discussion and possible action on facility rental & reservation policy related to damage deposits.**

I have attached feedback we have received from other communities and an updated policy reflecting the changes listed below. In review of how other communities handle damage deposits and through staff review and discussion. It is the recommendation of staff to:

- Change damage deposit amount from \$500 to \$200
- Deposit can be paid on-line at time of reservation or by check no later than 2 weeks prior to the rental
- The deposit is “processed” at the time of payment and will be returned via check no later than 2 weeks following the rental
- Staff will implement a process to track all deposits both in terms of being paid on-time and returned on-time.

**Senior Coordinator: Deb Weberpal**

- Chili Cook-off – Signups were slow this year. I currently have 7 participants. Seniors will be 8<sup>th</sup> if needed.
- Valentine’s Day Luncheon Friday – 56 signed up with a Patsy Cline tribute artist entertaining.
- Volunteer Safety Training – Go over what to do in emergency, new way to enter volunteer hours, review portions of the volunteer manual.
- Schedules Plus-Log in system is working well. Most seniors have adjusted. Training this month on how to register from home. Still some problems to tweak. Financials on it by July. People will be able to pay online and use credit cards.
- Senior receptionist: Patti Grosskreutz has been hired for 8 hours weekly. Funds are coming out of the fundraising account.

**Parks & Recreation Director: Matt Amundson**

- Introduce Student Intern, Kaylea Kau-UWW student, who reports to Michelle Dujardin
- Bicycle Advocacy Group met on Jan 30 with 27 attendees, diversity –UWW students & faculty, community, and there was good discussion. Overview of master plan, upcoming projects, UW-W student, Richard Guidry, volunteered to get group off the ground
- Stormwater –Received grants for the James street detention basin and the Whitewater Creek Stabilization project, There will be a public meeting February 20 at 6 pm at the Cravath Lakefront Center. Neighbors have been invited, Strand will be on hand to give overview of project and to answer questions.

**Considerations:**

**Presentation of 2013 Fall Recreation Program Financial Report & 2013 End of Year Report** Amundson referred to the packet and explained that an offering is a class and that the report is for direct expenses only. Does not include facility fees or staff costs (Amundson, Dujardin, Schultz, Weberpal). Knedler questioned 102% recovery at year end. The goal is ultimately set by the Council in the adoption of the overall department budget. Some programs can handle an increase in cost. The department is working toward covering overhead but also considering the impact to participants. In the future the Board will review the recreation program fee policy as it relates to cost recovery. A yearend report was required by the City Manager of all departments. Amundson reviewed this document with the Board. Amundson discussed how some Parks & Recreation departments run the “recreation side” as enterprise funds.

**Update regarding 4<sup>th</sup> of July Camping and review of draft agreement**

Amundson referred to the packet. July 4 committee is reviewing, next park and rec board, goes to city attorney. Provides upper shelter for the group. Includes city and 4<sup>th</sup> committee share costs of electrical improvements. Parker questioned blocking the lower shelter. Will look at after this years use. Group wants a long term commitment and 4<sup>th</sup> committee wants commitment for electrical improvement costs. Could also waive camping agreement that needs to be applied for annually. When fine tuned will bring back to the board.

**Discussion and possible action on facility rental & reservation policy**

Amundson showed the parks.org site and how it works to rent facilities and varied costs for different user groups. Set-up so people have to reserve blocks of time. Those wanting to reserve other blocks will have to come in to reserve and will not be able to do it online. Changes in the policy is going to a per hour fee with a minimum reservation of 4 hours. Assists in consistency, there has been decline in revenue and number of reservations. Hourly rate will be a slight decrease in fee. Rest of policy is same except the damage deposit. Can write a \$500 check which will be cashed or provide a credit card. We hold the number and charge the card after the rental. Renter is notified prior to charge. Problem is how to hold a credit card number securely. How can we manage efficiently moving forward? Parker suggested holding a check and only depositing if there is damage. Amundson will poll other communities and report back at a future meeting. Kidd moved to approve the policy as presented with the damage deposit to be reviewed at the next meeting. Second by Kaina. Ayes: Brandon Knedler, Sarah Hansberry, Jen Kaina, and Bruce Parker Nate Jaeger, Ken Kidd. Noes: None. Abstain: None. Absent: Rachel Deporter, Kim Gosh. Motion passed.

**Discussion and work session related to the Park & Open Space Plan / Parks & Recreation Strategic Plan**

Discussed the Effigy Mounds Preserve, Flat Iron Park, Main Street Shoppes Courtyard, Meadowsweet Park. Amundson is keeping notes of changes and will take all notes to Scott Weberpal who will update all of the maps when complete.

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Hello Matt,

Rich Sexton here from Clearwater Plant Harvesters. Thank you for sending the request for bid proposal. I am going to try and do my best to correctly fill out everything you need. In case my forms are not perfect, I would like to make sure I get a chance to work for your community. We charge \$200 per hour. This is based on the hourly meter on the harvester. We do not charge for anything else. We ask that you have the permits and that you also have a weed dump site within a reasonable driving distance. I never have formal contracts with my clients. You simply have me cut for as long as you feel you are happy with the way things look. This protects you and me. To determine how long it will take, and estimate the cost, we have a formula. We can project that we will cut 1 acre every 2 and 1 half hours. So determine which part of your lakes need cutting, figure the acreage, and we will have an estimate. There are some variables. We can only cut within 18 inches of the bottom. So if there is a real shallow area, you can cut that from the equation.

Matt, hopefully this gives you and I a starting point to work with. If you need references we have plenty in Wisconsin. My customers there are happy with our work, I think anyway!!!

Hello,

The City of Whitewater is requesting proposals for mechanical harvesting of aquatic plants on Cravath & Trippe Lakes. I have attached the report from Stantec who conducted chemical treatment in 2013. The proposal should include the following:

- Contractor assists City with DNR permit application, goal of navigational channels on both lakes (similar to chemical treatment in 2013 – see attached report from Stantec) and clear cut area in front of Cravath Lakefront Park on Cravath Lake for ski team performance during 4<sup>th</sup> of July festival

- Initial harvesting should occur between June 15 – June 30 to ensure desired appearance for 4<sup>th</sup> of July festival
- Additional harvesting schedule to be determined by City in consult with Contractor; anticipate a minimum of one additional harvesting
- City will provide compost location for harvested plants, contractor responsible for delivery to site located on attached map
- Proposal should included contractors cost in the following manner:
  - Cost per hour of harvesting
  - Estimated hours of harvesting Cravath Lake once
  - Estimated hours of harvesting Trippe Lake once

## 2014 WEED HARVESTING PROPOSAL

The work will be performed by Midwest Aquatics, LLC at Cravath and Trippe Lakes in Whitewater, WI, in June, 2014 with the option for a second harvest. The contractor will harvest the weeds, truck them to a nearby disposal site, provide a certificate of insurance, all equipment, and a log of hours on each harvester and loads of weeds removed.

The equipment provided will be a H6-300 Aquarius Harvester and a H6-600 Aquarius Harvester, a shore conveyor, and a dump truck.

The City of Whitewater Parks and Recreation (Whitewater) will provide access points for the shore conveyor, a suitable launch site, a nearby disposal area for weeds, and any required permits. Midwest Aquatics, llc will contract for a minimum of \$4800.00 which is based off the plan maps. The cost per hour for harvesting is \$150 on the 300 harvester and \$225 for the 600 harvester. If Cravath Lake needs additional harvesting for the ski area not noted on the map, the cost will be \$300 per additional acre. The fees will include the actual cutting of weeds, delivering them to shore, and trucking to a nearby disposal site. All travel time to and from the lake, and break time will be absorbed by Midwest Aquatics, LLC. 'Whitewater' will provide a site for cleaning the harvester after the each lake. Additional time may be purchased upon mutual consent of Midwest Aquatics, LLC and 'Whitewater'.

A 25% (\$1275.00) deposit will be required with the signed contract. All contract dates are reserved on a first come first served basis with signed contracts only. Payment will be made within 15 days of the project completion. A 25% cancellation fee will be charged for any cancellations received after May 15, 2014.

The City of Whitewater Parks and Recreation find the above prices and conditions satisfactory and accepted.

Midwest Aquatics, LLC is authorized to do the work as specified and payment shall be made as outlined above.

**I. PURPOSE**

The Whitewater Parks and Recreation Department schedules, maintains, rents, and reserves indoor facilities, park shelters, and outdoor athletic facilities to the general Whitewater community and surrounding area. These facilities, which include the Downtown Armory, Starin Community Building, Cravath Lakefront Community Center, ball diamonds, soccer fields and tennis courts, are located in City parks and also on city property. The Parks and Recreation Department will schedule these facilities for its own programs, the Whitewater Unified School District, the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater and other private and not-for-profit groups and organizations. These other groups and organizations include, but are not limited to: Traveling Basketball, Traveling Baseball, and the Whitewater Soccer Club. The following policies and procedures have been developed to facilitate the scheduling of athletic facilities by all organizations.

**II. SCHEDULING PRIORITIES**

The Whitewater Parks and Recreation Department will determine capacity limits for all facilities consistent with established and accepted standards to maintain facilities for continued use. These capacities will be utilized when scheduling activities and may impact the availability of facilities for reservations.

The Whitewater Parks and Recreation Department schedules and reserves facilities according to the following priorities:

1. All Whitewater Parks and Recreation programs (games, scheduled practices, matches, camps, and instructional programs) will be the first programs scheduled at facilities that are managed/maintained by the Parks and Recreation Department.
2. Whitewater Unified School District programs/athletic events will be the second programs scheduled at facilities managed/maintained by the City.
3. Whitewater Unified School District programs/athletic events will be the first programs scheduled at facilities owned by the District.
4. Whitewater Parks and Recreation programs will be the second programs scheduled at facilities owned by the Whitewater Unified School District.
5. Private and/or not-for-profit groups and organizations which reserved facilities managed/maintained by the City will have their programs and events scheduled after all Parks and Recreation and School District programs have been scheduled.

### III. GROUP CLASSIFICATIONS

#### **Group 1 No Charge**

Partner Organizations will not be charged a facility rental fee for their facility usage provided that their facility use is for the purposes of holding an organization meeting, practice, game, etc. Partner organizations provide a charitable good to the Whitewater community and have had a history of receiving free rentals for facility space.

Exception: Any event serving alcohol will be required to pay 100 % of rental fee.

#### **Long Term Rental Discount**

Rental Groups interested in special rates based on continuous use must enter request 10 days prior to the month they are requesting use to the Parks and Recreation Director, who shall present an agreement to the Parks and Recreation Board for their approval at the next scheduled monthly meeting.

#### IV. FEES & CHARGES

The facilities listed below must be rented a minimum of four (4) hours. Online reservations will be posted in four (4), eight (8), and sixteen (16) hour blocks. Requests outside of these blocks should be addressed with Parks and Recreation staff. A \$500 damage deposit is required for these facilities.

## V. RULES & REGULATIONS

- Full payment is required at the time of the reservation.
- Groups 1 & 2 must pick-up keys during normal business hours.
- The Whitewater Parks and Recreation Department reserves the right to deny programs and/or special events which conflict with existing programs, use facilities for an event the facilities were not intended, or cause undue hardship on the facility and/or surrounding area. The availability of facilities for Class 1 may be limited based on requests and other rentals. Groups in Class 1 & 2 can provide the damage deposit or sign a “financial responsibility and damage deposit” form.
- All groups must reserve the building for times needed including set-up and clean-up. In most cases, the contracted cleaning company will arrive at your scheduled completion time.
- All requests for facility rental refunds must be submitted in writing to the Parks and Recreation Board.
- **A \$200 damage deposit is required for all Group 3 reservations when reserving the Starin Community Building, Cravath Lakefront Center, and Downtown Armory. No deposits are required for picnic shelters. The deposit can be paid on-line at the time of reservation or by cash/check no later than 2 weeks prior to the rental. The deposit is processed at the time of payment and will be returned via check no later than 2 weeks following the rental.**
- All facility reservations must be made and completed in full a minimum of 10 days prior to the event. The Parks and Recreation Director can waive the 10 day minimum for special circumstances.
- For Groups 1 & 2, remember to check the site when you arrive! If there are any damages/problems please call 262-473-0122 immediately and leave a detailed message. The exact time of your call and your concerns will be documented.
- Separate permits are required for renters that are serving alcohol, using amplified sound systems (outdoor rentals only), or anyone selling merchandise or booth space. These permits can be obtained from the City Clerk’s office.
- All park regulations shall be observed. Municipal Buildings open at 7:00 am and close by 11:00 pm unless approved by the City Clerk at the time the contract is signed. Parks are open at 6:00 am and close at 12:00 am (midnight). The renter will forfeit \$100 of the damage deposit if they are in violation of the park curfew ordinance.
- Payment for the reservation is due in full before the facility is reserved. Photo ID is required with completed facility request form AND payment of damage deposit, as renter you are responsible for any damages.
- For Groups 1 & 2, keys are not distributed on weekend days. You must stop by City Hall before your event, Monday – Friday during normal business hours.
- Consumption of alcohol is by permit only and in compliance with applicable ordinances and regulations. Permits/requests to have alcohol in a city facility should be submitted with payment at least 2 weeks prior to the event date. Only the applicant may request an alcohol permit, and photo ID is required with the application. Failure to obtain the proper permits the renter will forfeit \$200 of the damage deposit.
- Applicant shall be liable for any loss, damage or injury sustained by virtue of the activity conducted. Damages fees are as follows: replace rectangular table \$150, replace folding chair \$50, replace stackable chair \$150, replace 60” round table \$350. Building maintenance will be estimated at a rate of \$50/hour. Carpet cleaning will result in a \$300 charge and any floor refinishing or resurfacing will range in cost from \$300-\$550.
- Handicapped accessible entrance doors are not allowed or able to be propped open. Please do not try and force the doors to stay open. Any damage done to the doors by keeping them open will be assessed to your damage deposit.

- No smoking is allowed in the City of Whitewater Buildings. Failure to comply the renter will forfeit \$200 of the damage deposit.
- Decorations are not to be attached in any way to the suspended ceiling at the Community Building. An eye-bolt is available in the ceiling of the West Room for hanging decorations. In all City facilities renters should avoid placing tape on the walls. No crepe paper is allowed in any rental facility.
- Please keep our facilities clean. It is the renter's responsibility to: bring your own dishtowels/cloths, wipe down tables and chairs and restore to the original locations, wipe down counters, appliances, and other surfaces, vacuum/clean floors and walls of any spills, clean any garbage from around the outside of the facility that your group may have caused, take all garbage with you after your event. Failure to remove garbage from the site is a \$100 charge against the damage deposit. Garbage can be taken to the dumpster located behind the Downtown Armory at 116 W North Street.
- Tent structures must be approved by the Parks and Recreation Director at time of facility request and comply with Diggers Hotline, Building Code and Fire Code requirements. No approval will be given and installation denied if compliance is not met.

## Save Your Ash Tree

### Tips for saving the Ash Trees

1. Identify the tree as an ash tree... if you are not sure contact the **Whitewater City Forestry Department** and they will assist you.
2. Determine if the tree is infected with **EAB**
3. Decide whether to treat for **EAB** or not
4. The city of **Whitewater** has been confirmed an **EAB** site
5. A healthy ash that is properly located in the landscape, has a nice shape and good fall color, provides shade, and has value to your property.
6. Symptoms of an **EAB** infestation can include canopy thinning starting in the upper portion of the tree, epicormic sprouting (i.e., formation of sprouts) along the trunk, bark splitting, and woodpecker damage near the top of the tree.
7. Most insecticides registered for **EAB** management require yearly applications to effectively protect a tree.
8. If your ash is smaller than 47 inches around the trunk at chest height, you may be able to treat your ash tree yourself.
9. Insecticide treatments are significantly more effective on **EAB**-infested ash trees with less than 50% canopy thinning. A Certified arborist with a license for pesticide application license can help treat your tree.
10. Insecticide treatments are not recommended for trees with greater than 50% canopy thinning; these trees should be removed.

### Tips on Ash Tree removal

1. *Trees that become infested with **EAB** and are not treated will ultimately die and will need to be removed.*
2. A small (less than 25 feet in height) ash tree may cost a few hundred dollars to be removed by an arborist. Larger trees may cost \$1,000 or more to be removed.
3. If you choose to remove an infested ash tree, check with your municipality to see if a wood disposal or utilization program is in place.

## Big Brick Park



Big Brick Park was acquired by the City in 2001 from the Whitewater Unified School District. It was the site of Union School, which was built in 1853-1854. In 1883, a combination high school and elementary school was built on this site, known as “Big Brick”. A high school program began in 1885, and the “Big Brick” school operated until it burned down in 1928. The basement had a very short ceiling and in stoking the furnace too high, the timbers caught fire.



## Effigy Mounds Preserve



One of the largest collections of effigy mounds in the country, numbering 12 to 15, is found near Indian Mounds Parkway. The mounds were estimated to be built between 800 to 1200 A.D. The oldest mounds are geometric shapes, and the more recent ones resemble animal shapes ranging in size from 60 to 300 feet. Studies suggest that these mounds were a gathering place for several Midwestern Native America tribes. Samuel Prince, Whitewater's first settler, built a log cabin in this area.

### Recommendations:








